

In 1886, Henry Fairchild DeBardeleben, a Birmingham industrialist, founded the city of Bessemer in western Jefferson County, as the site of two iron furnaces. His father-in-law, Daniel Pratt, founded the Pratt Coal and Coke Company in 1878 to furnish coal and coke for the iron-making facilities at Oxmoor near Birmingham. Although DeBardeleben originally named the settlement Brooklyn, he changed the name to honor Sir Henry Bessemer and the process he developed to create steel inexpensively.

with seven schools and about 5,200 students. At present there are 17 schools with about 14,000 students. Pictures will be used to illustrate this expansion. As an employee of the Hoover City Schools, Jason will provide an insight on the present status of the system and discuss future challenges such as ensuring adequate financial support, continuing to provide an excellent education for the students and meeting rezoning requirements.

Alabama historians gather annually to share their research, hear presentations, hold business meetings and workshops, bestow awards, and visit a new locale with its own historical sites for touring. Birmingham is hosting the 71<sup>st</sup> Annual Meeting of the Alabama Historical Association April 12-14 at the DoubleTree by Hilton downtown.

Local sites include Arlington House, the Birmingham theatres, the Civil Rights District, and a Historic Renovation Walking Tour. Hoover is offering docent-led tours of the Stinson Ole Place and the Hale-Joseph Home in Bluff Park on Thursday, April 12, from 1 to 3 PM. Birmingham's archivist Jim Baggett will discuss the history of Birmingham at the opening session and Dr. Bernard LaFayette, Jr., will address the awards banquet.

Thirteen new historical markers were placed around the state in 2017 by AHA and its Fall Pilgrimage will be held in Camden in late October. More information about the historical association may be found at <a href="https://www.alabamahistory.net">www.alabamahistory.net</a>.

### Mayor describes the state of the city to Prime Timers

Mayor Frank Brocato delivered his second state of the city address to Ross Bridge's Prime Timers group on February 26<sup>th</sup> (as well as other groups across the city.)

The mayor reported that he kept his full-time commitment to the office and stated that he enjoyed City Hall "bustling with our citizens coming by to talk about many things...every day they want to talk about our city and how to make it better." He said that Hoover citizens are involved in boards, schools, and volunteering.

He cited Hoover's great recreation center, its parks, and the police and fire departments, but gave special note to the Senior Center. The center is "an oasis for many of our seniors" with 24,000 member visits annually. He was proud to announce the center will receive accreditation this year, "the first in the state of Alabama to earn accreditation."

Brocato invited all who may have missed the town hall meetings to visit www.FutureHoover.com, a survey initiative, to share your input. The survey takes about 15 minutes and will accept responses through the end of March 2018.

The mayor focused on three goals for the year: the developers, school system, and economic development. In view of recent current events, school safety led with the announcement that every school now has trained, veteran officers on duty for public safety. On the topic of city development, he cited the City Planner hired six months ago, who is dedicated full-time to planning Hoover's growth and "developing a comprehensive plan." The third goal discussed was that of economic development, with the news that Iberia Bank is locating their Operations Center at an older facility, International Park and McLeod Software, an "IT" company is moving to Meadowbrook. He believes the Highway 31/Riverchase area will rebrand as an "IT Corridor."

Of great concern is the retail industry "taking a big hit" as a result of online shopping. Millions of dollars in tax revenue are lost to the City of Hoover; however, he is working with state and federal representatives to recover some of the tax monies. "The loss is great—\$1

million dollars spent in the city nets \$30,000 in tax revenue whereas online, that same million nets only \$550," he added.

He stated that City Hall has cut or curtailed travel, office supplies, Professional Development, and trimmed budgets to "run as efficiently as possible." He reported on the 150 Project, expected to finish in July and said the additional interchange at South Shades Crest Road will remove 10,000 cars per day off Hwy. 150. He is working with Congressman Gary Palmer and Senator Richard Shelby to secure monies for the project. The mayor closed with a Q & A session with residents of several neighborhoods in the Ross Bridge area.
