




Moss Rock is coming!

In December 2020, Ken Boyd's latest book entitled *Historic Watermills of North America*, was released by the University of Alabama Press. This large-format coffee table book represents more than 40 years of Ken's research, study and photography and provides a visual preservation of these fascinating old structures along with descriptions, commentary and perspectives. Ken has previously published two very popular and internationally distributed books on historic locomotives, entitled *Historic North American Locomotives (*Published by Kalmbach Media / *Trains*, 2018) and *The Art of the Locomotive* (Published by Voyageur Press, 2014). Total sales for the locomotive books have exceeded 35,000 copies.

Support Our Soldiers of Alabama is a nonprofit organization 501(C) 3 created in the memory of Lance Corporal Thomas E. Rivers, Jr. He was a Marine KIA in Afghanistan April 28, 2010, by an IED while on patrol. He graduated from Briarwood Christian School. His mother, Charon Rivers, and sister Rachel decided to keep his memory alive by continuing to send care packages to the troops with whom he was deployed even after his death. This 'snowballed' and they ended up sending packages to several different branches of our military around the globe. Mrs. Rivers continued working from her basement at home in the Hoover area for ten years, sending out items with the help of donations and volunteers. My husband is a member of the VFW post named in memory of LCPL Rivers in Alabaster. LCPL Thomas E Rivers Jr.

Mrs. Rivers was ready to hand the baton off to someone else and chose me and my husband (Tony Garcia) along with Mark Davis of Vettes4Vets and the Alabama Fallen Warrior Project. We chose to carry on this amazing opportunity in Thomas's name and memory. We are now located and have an office in the Alabaster area, close to where the VFW meets on the first Saturday of each month, and just across the street from the new Alabaster Veterans Center, Our purpose is to send out care packages to deployed troops to let them know that they have not been forgotten and that we here at home are thankful for their sacrifice. These packages include items that they may not be able to pick up locally such as baby wipes; chap stick; beef jerky and various other protein items; a variety of snacks; flavored drink packets to add to water; puzzle books; hygiene items; and so much more! We also include a small Bible and the booklet that tells Thomas' story and testimony. We have had several people email us and thank us for

what we do because they received a care package and how much it means to them to know they have not been forgotten. Everything we do is on a voluntary basis and everything we send is donated or purchased with the monetary donations we receive. To date in 2021, we have sent 600 care packages to Korea, Afghanistan, and the Arctic Circle. We've sent out several individual birthday boxes to several different locations. We plan on sending out another 600 from now through Christmas. We also help local Veteran's and their families in any way we can.

As a 25-year veteran photography instructor at Samford University and The University of Alabama at Birmingham, his work, techniques and reviews have been published in numerous magazines and journals, including *Camera and Darkroom*, *View Camera, Birmingham, Portico, Shutterbug, Shelby Living, Garden Railways, Hoover Sun, Over the Mountain Journal, Alabama Heritage*, and technical and trade publications and journals, such as *Power, Power Engineering, Industrial Hygiene*, and *Environmental Management*. He is currently the editor for a historical newsletter, entitled the *Mid-South Flyer*, a bimonthly publication of the Railway & Locomotive Historical Society.

In 2020, *Alabama Heritage* magazine published two feature research articles and photo essays prepared by Ken entitled:

- Industrial Revolution The Locomotive Comes to Alabama (Number 137, Summer 2020).
- Kymulga Grist Mill: An Operating Mid-Nineteenth-Century Alabama Watermill (Number 138, Fall 2020).

He has recently signed a contract to provide a similar feature on the subject of preserving historic fire protection equipment in Alabama (Summer 2022). In addition, Ken's watermill work will be featured in the upcoming November – December holiday issue of *Alabama Magazine*.

He is a graduate of Jacksonville State University and The University of Alabama at Birmingham and retired from a 37-year research and environmental affairs career at Southern Company.

Ken's program is featured at our November General Meeting, scheduled to meet at the Hoover Public Library in the Shakespeare Room (across from the theatre) at 1 PM.

Beverly Williamson taught about quilting; Sandra Fuller and Ginny Peterson discussed the first and second floors of the cabin; Marjo Gann demonstrated children's toys from the 1840's era while Jim and Ann Langley described the operation of the Syrup mill and served up a taste of sorghum butter. New to the docent staff was Bob Kolar who built the fire for the wash pot. A washday demo was led by Debbie Burtnett.

The next guests at the Stinson Ole Place will be Bluff Park Elementary School's fourth graders—a total of 100+ students and teachers. Five folklore demonstrations are scheduled plus the station in the cabin. This will be the first visit by BPES since the Pandemic began in March 2020. Folklore Director Gene Fuller said, "This will be a big event that the students and teachers have been looking forward to for many months. We are hoping for good weather on November 5th."
