## History of the Hoover City School System updated

In 2017, Dr. Charles E. Hickman was asked by the Hoover Historical Society to write an historical account of the formation and growth of the Hoover City Schools System. Dr. Hickman was an excellent person for this work because he had served as a member of the Hoover Board of Education of the first two years of its existence and he continued to follow subsequent events as the new school district grew in both size and reputation.

Since 2017, significant events and projects have occurred which led Dr. Hickman to create a new edition. He asked Dr. Ron Dodson, a recently retired administrator from the school system, to partner with him in this updated work. The new 2022 edition includes everything in the previous edition along with new content such as the following:

- Creation of the Riverchase Career Connection Center (RC3)
- Response to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Transition of leadership from Dr. Kathy Murphy to Dr. Dee Fowler
- Renovation of the old Bluff Park School
- New challenges and opportunities ahead

"It was an honor and a privilege to work with Dr. Hickman on this updated edition," said Dr. Dodson. He continued, "I was a brand-new teacher in Hoover when it first began operations in 1988. Knowing that Dr. Hickman and I were working together both then and now is a special connection that I treasure."

Hoover's history as a city is one of success—ranked #1 Best Place to Live in Alabama by 24/7 Wall Street in 2021 and the school system named the fourth Best Place to Work in Alabama by Forbes Magazine in 2022. Such success does not just happen. Dr. Dodson wrote, "...this account of the school system's rise from a failed community vote to a nationally recognized high-achieving school district is a story worth

remembering."

Copies of the 2022 edition can be purchased from Dr. Hickman for \$20 (or the editor of this newsletter.) For every book sold, Dr. Hickman will donate \$5 to the Hoover City Schools System. The book will be presented at the March 14<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Board of Education.

## Here's to History-from our president...

Lovers of history should be amazed at the number of historical sites of significance in Alabama. I attended a Colonial Dames XVII Century conference recently, and as I drove toward Huntsville, I mulled over the history of the space program. The removal of our Saturn rocket from the I-65 northernmost welcome station will bring a close to that remarkable landmark, although it can never erase the achievements of the Space Program.

One of our 'Dames XVII Century speakers was a German descendant of one of those remarkable families brought here after WWII during the great race to space. (There's another whole story behind "brought here," but that's not for today.) He reminded us of the many rockets that were associated with the NASA Marshall Flight Center in Huntsville. He noted that the scientists preferred training in Alabama with the actual engineers who developed the programs and materials over the facility in Texas. He pointed out a few of the vast number of remarkable inventions from the NASA Space and Rocket Center and Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville. The anti-gravity tanks for weightlessness? Ours. The precisionmirrors continually used in space? Ours. The towers used in Florida to launch rockets? Ours. The battery designed on the lunar Rover? Ours actually a brother-in-law. While the original building known as the 4200 Complex was recently demolished, even they knew to save thousands of photographs, documents, and videos as archives for future generations.

The future is ours, too, as these men and women are currently working on big plans for the future. Reminding us of our Colonial days and how long it took to create a new nation, our speaker said that we are on the fast track as far as colonizing other planets. What's present and future now will one day be part of Alabama history.

Also while at the conference, I met two delightful ladies who lived in Aliceville, Alabama. They, too, remarked about the Germans--prisoners in fact, who returned after the war, and settled in Alabama. If you haven't yet read *Guests Behind the Barbed Wire*, *German POWs in America: A True Story of Hope and Friendship* by Ruth Beaumont Cook, please do so. I can't wait to visit Aliceville.
